Global *Autism* Public Health (GAPH) Initiative

A Decade of Global Collaboration to Enhance ASD Research, Practice and Policy (2009 – 2019



GLOBAL AUTISM PUBLIC HEALTH Technical support to committed government and NGO partners

Started with 2 countries in 2009, now supporting over 80 countries

Engine for Change - A Global Network of Accomplished Advocates



- Local leaders with record of innovation and facilitating change.
- Self-advocates, caregivers, researchers, professionals, policymakers, friends and families.
- Continuous social media interactions; Biennial meetings to facilitate knowledge exchange/transfer collaboration.
- High impact collaboration (e.g., WHA, CST).
- 54 countries in 2018; transition to regional sustainability

Priorities:

Development, implementation and evaluation of community-based services with a focus on health equity

Strategy:

Relevance and impact through multi-stakeholder collaboration and leveraging

Products:

Data + tools to help mobilize knowledge, empower communities and enable better outcomes at individual, family and community levels

Examples:

- Screening and diagnostic tools
- Intervention/Inclusion programs
- *Policy/economics tools*
- Services navigation tools
- Community data platforms





Advocacy Leadership Network (ALN)

Engine for Change - A Global Network of Accomplished Advocates

- UN and World Health Assembly autism resolutions • *Autism Speaks role: Content expert; advocate (via ALN)*
- 1st national prevalence estimate in South Korea, Mexico, India, Qatar and China

Autism Speaks role: Co-funder; technical advisor

- National action plans, guidelines & training programs: Qatar, Albania, Bangladesh, Malaysia, Serbia, China
 Autism Speaks role: Technical advisor
- Often-cited "cost of autism" study (Knapp + Mandell, 2012)
 - Autism Speaks role: funder
- 1st randomized controlled trial (RCT) using "task-sharing" strategy to deliver evidence-based autism intervention in low resource communities

o Autism Speaks role: Funder

- Caregiver Skills Training program, 1st WHO-UNICEF intervention package using "task-sharing" strategy to deliver evidence-based autism intervention in low resource communities
 - o Autism Speaks role: Co-funder, co-technical lead, trainer





An *International* Priority

World Report on Developmental Delays, Disorders and Disabilities



Overview



- Global multi-stakeholders collaboration driven by a WHO, UNICEF and Autism Speaks partnership.
- First report of its kind. Prioritizes conditions not well covered elsewhere, including autism, ADHD, intellectual disabilities and cerebral palsy.
- A lifespan perspective.
- Targets Ministries of Health and Education, policy makers, advocates, nongovernmental organizations, researchers, health workers, the media, and the general pubic.
- Highlights opportunities for multi-sectorial coordination and action in early childhood development (ECD), health and disabilities
- Inclusion of users perspectives (i.e., primary data collection from the community): Bulgaria, Canada, Argentina, Turkey, Brazil
- Draft due November, 2020 (COVID-informed), with official launch planned in 2021





Aims



- Increase awareness of the public health significance of developmental delays, and disabilities for children and their families.
- Compile data on epidemiology, human resources, services, policies, and users' perspectives regarding child-onset developmental delays, disorders and disabidisorderslities.
- Provide guidance on strengthening health systems and multisectoral actions towards provision of nurturing care and enabling environment for children with developmental delays, disorders and disabilities and their families.
- Document good (evidence-based) and innovative practices.
- Provide guidance on collection of data through health information systems and population-based monitoring.
- Provide baseline data on policies and services for developmental delays, disorders and disabilities in selected countries along with indicators and strategy to track progress.
- Call upon partners for international and national advocacy efforts.

Community data resources and needs assessment



A basic *Question*

What do we know about autistic people and their families in our community...

Where's the *data*???

Basic information important for policy development, implementation and evaluation:

- Who are they (i.e. users)?
- Where are they?
- What are their needs? What services are provided?
- What are the challenges in meeting those needs?
- What are the outcomes?





Where's the *data*?

Administrative datasets (cities, counties, state, federal)







Access and key variables differ by community (e.g., state); Linkage at community level?

Structural/process barriers (e.g., access), cultural factors, socio-economic factors, knowledge disparities, quality, etc



Data that inform policy development, implementation and evaluation:

- Who are they (i.e. users)? ٠
- *Where are they?* •
- What are their needs?* What services are provided? •

Family Needs Assessment Survey ata-glance:

- 0 Revised version of Autism Speaks Caregiver Needs Assessment tool fielded in 11 Southeast European (5) and South American countries (6)
- o Improved alignment with existing frameworks in needs assessment
- o Based on well-established needs surveys
- o Modular (e.g., addition of stigma module)
- o Designed to be translated/adapted to enhance user experience and data quality







Autism Speaks *Public Health* Research

Family Needs Assessment

Next steps:

- o Pilot online version (Q1, 2020)
- o Adapted for collection of user data in Argentina, Brazil, Bulgaria, Canada, China, Turkey and Uganda to inform WHO World Report (Q3, 2020)
- o Pilot additional modules (e.g., stigma)
